

## CARVED IN STONE

### MARGASONS/MORGASONS QUERY RESEARCH

MARGASON IS NOT A COMMON NAME IN SOUTHERN INDIANA RECORDS. THE NAME GOT BUTCHERED A LOT: MARGASON, MORGASON, MORGISON, MORGANSON..EVEN *MARGERSON*. A WIDOW WAS LISTED ON THE 1850 BARTHOLOMEW CO. CENSUS WITH HER NEW HUSBAND, SOME OF HIS CHILDREN, SOME OF HERS. (AND THEN SHE DIED SHORTLY AFTERWARD.) THE MYSTERY OF COURSE, WAS, "WHO WAS HER FIRST HUSBAND

AND WHEN DID HE DIE?" AND "WHAT WAS HER MAIDEN NAME?" THE INQUIRER WAS A DESCENDANT OF REBECCA MARGASON, 10 YEARS OLD IN 1850. THE PUZZLE WAS ADDRESSED, AND THOUGH IT AFFECTS ONLY A SMALL LINE OF DESCENDANTS, THE LESSONS MAY BE USEFUL TO YOUR SEARCHES.

**1. I FOUND THEM ON CENSUS, I'M DONE WITH THAT RESOURCE.** AND USUALLY SO, BUT THERE ARE EXCEPTIONS, LIKE THIS: ELIZABETH MARGASON WAS ENUMERATED ON THE 1850 CENSUS....TWICE. THE DESCENDANT HAD FOUND HER LISTED WITH HER NEW HUSBAND, "MITCHAEAL" LEWIS, IN FLAT ROCK TWP., OCT. 14, 1850. THEY HAD MARRIED JULY 11, 1850. THERE WERE FOUR OLDER LEWIS CHILDREN IN THE HOUSEHOLD, THEN REBECCA "MORGASON," THEN ELIZABETH AND HENRY, DITTOED TO "MORGASON," THEN NATHAN LEWIS, 8/12. THE QUERIER REPORTED THAN HENRY "TOOK THE LEWIS NAME."

THE 1850 MORTALITY SCHEDULE REPORTS THAT MALINDA LEWIS DIED MAY 1850. MICHAEL LEWIS MARRIED MALINDA GINTLE IN 1843—SO FAIRLY CLEAR THAT THE BABY NATHAN LEWIS WAS *HERS*. HE HAD REMARRIED QUICKLY—A PRAGMATIC MOVE, NOT UNUSUAL FOR A WIDOWER TRYING TO KEEP A LITTLE BABY ALIVE AND A HOUSEHOLD AFLOAT. MEN AND BOYS WORKED THE FARM, WOMEN AND GIRLS RAN THE HOME.

NOW THERE AREN'T MANY MARGASON/MORGASON MARRIAGES IN BARTHOLOMEW CO. RECORDS, SO IT WAS NECESSARY TO TAKE A LONG LOOK AT THE ONES THAT WE DID HAVE. THERE WERE FIVE, WITH THREE DIFFERENT SPELLINGS, BUT THEY WERE CLUSTERED BETWEEN 1849-1858. THE LAST WAS REBECCA E. MORGISSON, TO MARCUS L. TAYLOR, OUR QUERIER'S LINE. THE OTHERS WERE JAMES (1853), JOSEPH (1849), SUSAN MANAH (1855), AND KEZIAH (1849). A SEARCH WAS MADE FOR THOSE 1849 UNIONS: JOSEPH MARRIED A MARGARET BARNES, AND THE ONLY LIKELY PAIR THAT SHOWED UP IN 1850 WERE LIVING IN JEFFERSON CO., SHE QUITE A BIT OLDER THAN HE, WITH A 9 YEAR OLD GIRL IN THE HOUSEHOLD. NOT MUCH PROMISE THERE. THEN KEZIAH, WHO MARRIED JOHN BANISTER. NO LUCK SEARCHING THE 1850 FOR KEZIAH OR JOHN BANISTER/BANNISTER, ETC. SO THE SEARCH WAS AMENDED: SEARCH *ONLY* ON THE FIRST NAME, AND USING THE "WILDCARD" OPTION (YOU NEED AT LEAST 3 LETTERS AND THEN \* FOR ANCESTRY.COM SEARCHING.) KEZ\* IN 1850 BARTHOLOMEW CO. INDIANA BRINGS UP FOUR LISTINGS, NO HITS. KEZIAH IS ALSO SOMETIMES SPELLED KIZIAH, SO KIZ\* WAS TRIED NEXT. BINGO! THE FIRST ITEM UP IS KIZIA BUNESTER.

LO AND BEHOLD, NOT ONLY DID THE LISTING INCLUDE JOHN AND KIZIA "BUNESTER," BUT ALSO ELIZABETH "MORGARON," AS WELL AS JAMES, SUSANNA AND REBECCA E. MORGARON. NOW IT'S VERY PECULIAR: ELIZABETH MARRIED MIKE LEWIS IN JULY; AND SHE'S LISTED IN HIS HOUSEHOLD IN OCT., ALL VERY LOGICAL. YET HERE IS THIS ADDITIONAL LISTING, TAKEN IN AUGUST, AND IT'S THE SAME WOMAN, SAME CHILD REBECCA E.

**2. THEY'RE ON THE CENSUS, THAT MUST BE THEIR CORRECT NAME.** NAH. OF COURSE, THE MORE COMMON ERROR IS A STEP-CHILD GETTING LISTING WITH THE NEW DADDY'S SURNAME. THIS CASE WAS THE REVERSE, QUITE RARE. ELIZABETH AND HENRY, LISTED AFTER REBECCA MORGASON, DITTOED TO HER SURNAME? THEY WERE REALLY LEWIS CHILDREN. WHEN MIKE LEWIS DIED IN 1860, HENRY INHERITED MONEY. STEP-CHILDREN, BELOVED OR OTHERWISE, DIDN'T GET SQUAT. IF THEY GOT MONEY, THEY WERE BLOOD. SO THE CENSUS WAS JUST PLAIN WRONG ABOUT THOSE DITTOED SURNAMES.

THE QUERIER HAD FOUND A LAND PURCHASE RECORD IN JENNINGS CO. IN 1841, JOSEPH MARGASON, AND WONDERED IF HE MIGHT HAVE BEEN THE MISSING HUSBAND OF ELIZABETH \_\_\_\_\_, AND FATHER OF REBECCA. MOST OF THE EARLY MARGASON ET AL MARRIAGES IN INDIANA WERE IN JEFFERSON CO., INCLUDING ONE FOR JOSEPH MARGASON AND LUCRETIA TATUM, 1829; PLUS JAMES, JOHN, BUT NO ONE MARRIED AN ELIZABETH. JOSEPH AND LUCRETIA WERE LISTED IN JEFFERSON CO. IN 1850, SO CLEARLY NOT HIM. AND NONE OF THEM EARLY ENOUGH TO BE PARENTS OF KEZIAH IN ANY CASE; SHE WAS BORN 1824.

SEARCHED BARTHOLOMEW CO. TAX RECORDS NEXT, "JOS. MAGARSON" IN 1843, NO HELP. THEN BENJ. MORGESON, COLUMBUS TWP. 1845. NO REAL ESTATE, PERSONAL PROPERTY ONLY AND ONE POLL TAX. HE WAS LISTED AGAIN IN 1846, NO LAND, PERSONAL PROPERTY, POLL TAX, AND (DRUM ROLL PLEASE) AT THE END OF THE LINE: *DEAD*.

BENJAMIN MARGASON? NOTHING IN INDIANA MARRIAGE RECORDS. ELIZABETH WAS BORN IN KENTUCKY, SO A SEARCH WAS RUN FOR A KENTUCKY MARRIAGE RECORD: BENJAMIN MORGESON AND ELIZABETH SKIDMORE, 18 MAY 1820, HENRY CO. KY. A SEARCH OF THAT SKIDMORE FAMILY REVEALED SEVERAL OF THEM MOVED TO BROWN AND JOHNSON COS., INDIANA. NOT HARD PROOF, BUT EXTREMELY LIKELY PROSPECTS.

BENJAMIN MARGASON DOES NOT SEEM TO BE LISTED ANYWHERE ON THE 1840 CENSUS, FRUSTRATING. BUT HE IS LISTED IN 1830, IN JEFFERSON CO., ALONG WITH SEVERAL LIKELY BROTHERS AND A POSSIBLE FATHER. AND THEY ARE ALL INDEXED AS, "MRGERSON." THEY WERE FOUND BY SEARCHING ONLY FOR FIRST NAME BEN\* IN JEFFERSON CO. IN 1830. WHEN MRGERSON CAME UP, I RAN THAT SURNAME, AND THREE MORE CAME UP. OR COURSE IT'S A TRANSCRIPTION ERROR, BUT AT LEAST IT'S CONSISTENT--AND SHOWS FAMILY STRUCTURE AND PATTERN. ONE, JOHN MRGERSON, WAS AGE 50-60. POPPA?

THAT'S REALLY ALL THAT COULD BE DONE FROM HERE. THERE WERE NO MARKED GRAVES, NOR ANY ESTATE RECORDS IN BARTHOLOMEW THAT COULD CONCLUSIVELY DOCUMENT THIS LINEAGE; BUT POSSIBILITIES IN JEFFERSON CO. IN AND HENRY CO. KY, OR PERHAPS BROWN OR JOHNSON CO. AT LEAST THE QUERIER HAS A BETTER IDEA WHO TO LOOK FOR: A JOHN MORGASON ESTATE AFTER 1830; OR A SKIDMORE ESTATE THAT NAMES MORGASON GRANDCHILDREN, FOR INSTANCE; OR A CHILDLESS SIBLING'S ESTATE THAT NAMES NIECES AND NEPHEWS.

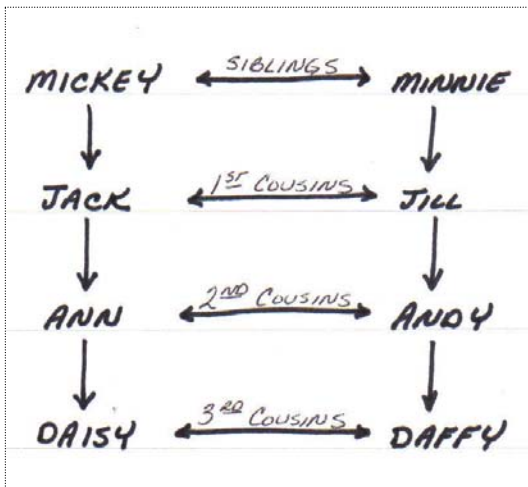

# WHO IS MY COUSIN ?

You know your first cousin...but, who is your second cousin ? And who is once removed ? Maybe this explanation will help map it out for you.....

## Counting down generations evenly

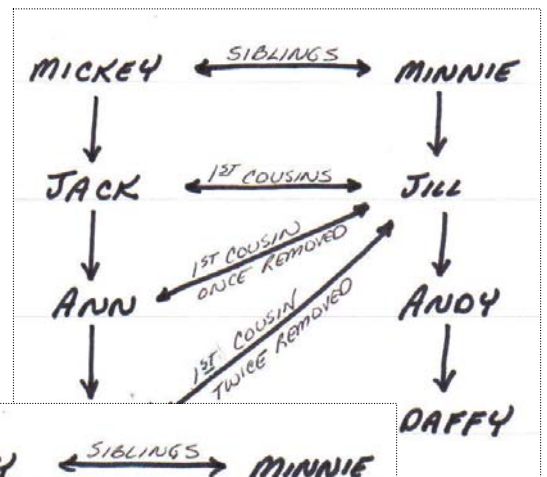


In this example, Mickey & Minnie are siblings. Their children are 1<sup>st</sup> cousins to each other; their grandchildren are 2<sup>nd</sup> cousins to each other; their great grandchildren are 3<sup>rd</sup> cousins to each other; etc.

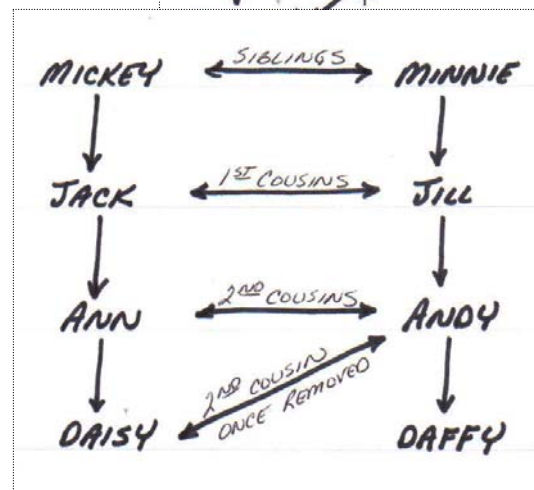
It is when one line stays the same and you move down the other, that you get the "removed" terminology. If you are 1<sup>st</sup> cousins, you are always 1<sup>st</sup> cousin to that cousin's family, but each generation you go down from that cousin, counts as removed.

## Counting down generations from one side

In the same example, Jack & Jill are 1<sup>st</sup> cousins. So, Jill's relationship to Jack's family is always 1<sup>st</sup> cousin. Jack's children are 1<sup>st</sup> cousin once removed to Jill; Jack's grandchildren are 1<sup>st</sup> cousin twice removed to Jill; etc.



And, in the same example, Ann & Andy are 2<sup>nd</sup> cousins. So, Andy's relationship to Ann's family is always 2<sup>nd</sup> cousin. Ann's children are 2<sup>nd</sup> cousin once removed to Andy; Ann's grandchildren are 2<sup>nd</sup> cousin twice removed to Andy, etc.





## Researcher's Resources *-by Jane Johnson*

*"It can be stated with absolute certainty that no history can ever be truly complete. Even the interpretations may be incorrect because no two people view the past with the same eyes."*

Betty Liebert was a BCGS member who pursued her family history with love and determination. She never had a chance to publish her work but left a large body of research notes. Some of the information she gathered was very specific to her family but some of the information was of a more general nature in relationship to her connection to Bartholomew County's older families. The following is a letter to her from Mary Frances Urbahns.

December 30, 1979

Chas. Vogelsang to Louise Obermark Mar 15, 1871

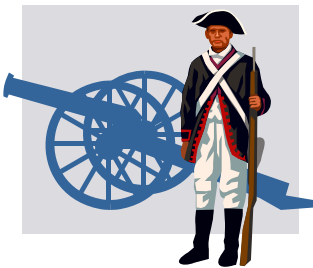
Will Vogelsang, Sr., to Mary Reinking May 27, 1875

Will Vogelsang to Lydie Arnholt, Sept 1, 1901

Peter Zurbrugg to Lena Overmark May 6, 1870 (this may have been a sister to Henry)

Many genealogy magazines review new and frequently used websites. Family Tree Magazine features a yearly list of 101 Best Web Sites. In these reviews, they note which websites are free and which websites charge. You may have tried the familiar [www.findagrave.com](http://www.findagrave.com) but also try [www.interment.net](http://www.interment.net) Try the helpful nationwide gravesite locator, [www.gravelocator.cem.va.gov](http://www.gravelocator.cem.va.gov) for military veterans.



Veterans Day is coming up. If you have never tried to obtain military records for your ancestors, now might be the time. With the help of Ancestry.com's military section you can check indices for war service. [www.archives.gov](http://www.archives.gov) is the website for the national archives that includes military records. You can order records on-line or through the mail with the information you have obtained you're your index search. The more information you provide, the more likely your records will arrive. The cost is now \$75 for a complete civil war file. You may hesitate in ordering, but don't. Records can include health and prison records and well as materials related to pensions and

disability. Some records may include up to 100 pages.

Our March, 2010 program was presented by Donna Kuhlman on Early Roads & Towns of Bartholomew County. Extra input from some of our knowledgeable local members added to Donna's information, which included the fact that roads moved all the time! As government got more involved, roads were easier to follow, as they were straighter, and less prone to follow the whims of individuals' convenience to their own homes! Railroad growth meant towns also grew and roads extended Northward. As trade routes changed, some families moved their homes, barns and belongings via mule train, using the house's floor joists as runners! Some roads were never officially platted, but careful platting of the location of some early buildings meant never having to deal with flooding - even in the summer of 2008!

Member Bill Chisman shared a mammoth genealogy chart going back to a King of England! His daughter helped him use a program, *The Master Genealogist*, which he thinks is the best program out there at ~\$89; however, Bill found it hard to use.

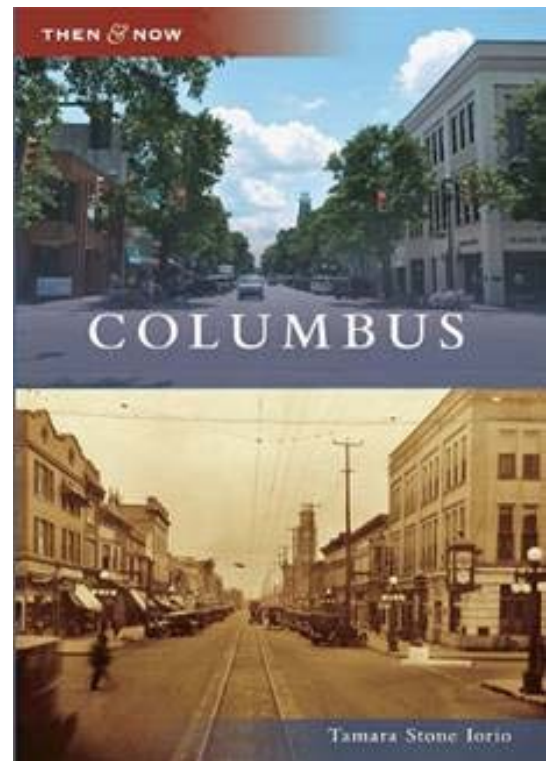
## Columbus Then and Now
