Our Bartholomew County Genealogical Society has had another great year because of a great board of officers and directors. I hope that the next time you see one of them you will thank her for service on the board.

Officers and Board Members

First, I want to thank one of our outgoing officers, Margot Green. After many years of dedicated service on the BCGS Board, Margot is "retiring" from her position as Secretary. As noted in the 4th Quarter of *Ancestors*, "Margot has diligently served as our President (4 years), Past President, & Secretary. She has always provided excellent leadership and service for the board and the entire Society." Together we must say "Thank you for job(s) well done!" While we will certainly miss Margot on the BCGS board, we hope that she will continue to enjoy many years of BCGS membership as she continues her genealogical work.

Next, I want to thank Becky Speaker for her continuing service on the BCGS board as our Treasurer and past Webmaster and for her willingness to be our Secretary in 2015. Her support of the BCGS board and programs has been outstanding. We are delighted that she will continue to share her talents on our board.

In 2015, we welcome Toni Whiteside onto our BCGS board as our Treasurer. Toni is well acquainted with the office of the Treasurer since she serves on other boards in the same capacity. As Treasurer, she will report to the board concerning all BCGS accounts and receive membership dues. She was elected to this position during our November program.

Heather McDonald has agreed (and was re-elected) to serve as our Vice President in 2015. As Vice-President, Heather will secure speakers and schedule programs for the upcoming years. She also assists the BCGS President in his absence. Heather has enjoyed looking ahead to plans for 2016.

BCGS continues to be served well by our two genealogists, Donna Kuhlman and Karen Loy, who assist with the 30 plus queries that come to the Society throughout the year. Queries often come by e-mail, but also arrive by word of mouth or snail mail. Both Donna and Karen are more than capable in assisting those with such queries. Both plan to continue to serve as our BCGS genealogists in 2015.

Our Membership List is overseen by our Membership Chair, Fran Land, who will continue to serve in this capacity in 2015. Fran accounts for all of our BCGS members. She also continues to be a great help during our Programs by assisting with attendance recordkeeping and nametag distribution & collection. Fran reported that we had 74 members in 2014 including 14 life memberships. We had 10 new members in 2014.

Our BCGS Editor Kim Ray composes, edits, and submits our quarterly newsletter, *Ancestors*. We have fully transitioned to a full-color e-newsletter for our membership, sister organizations, and libraries. These newsletters can also be found posted on the BCGS website: www.barthgen.org. Kim will continue as our BCGS Editor in 2015.

In July 2013, Reference Librarian Annette Blount began attending our board meetings as a "library liaison." The board continues to appreciate her presence and input at our monthly meetings and her work in the Indiana room.

As you can tell, BCGS has a wonderful group of active and effective officers and directors who have faithfully met on the third Tuesday of every month (except December) throughout 2014. For a fourth year, I will have the privilege of serving alongside these BCGS board members as the BCGS President.

Programs

During 2014, BCGS hosted seven programs and two S.K.I.L.L.S. meetings for BCGS members. Our first program on January 25 was entitled "Sandhill revisited." Originally, Helen Wildermuth of Stonehugger Cemetery Restoration was planning to share details about her work at Sandhill Cemetery. However, because of a death in her family, Ron Shadley was so gracious to present again to BCGS members and friends concerning all the repairs at Sandhill Cemetery. Even with all the bad winter weather in January, the total attendance was 19 (15 members & 4 guests).

Although BCGS does not regularly have a February program, on February 22, Allison Singleton presented "Facebooking Your Past" in a program co-hosted with the Bartholomew County Library. Those present, 14 members and 10 guests, enjoyed a highly informative program about how Facebook can be a "prime genealogical resource for research."

In March (22), Jason Hatton, Library Assistant Director, provided information to a total of 27 (12 members & 15 guests) about "Using Google like a Pro for Genealogy." We learned how to maximize our use of Google searching and other products to make the most of our genealogical searches.

Our second S.K.I.L.L.S meeting (first was in 2013) was held on April 26 in the Indiana Room. Seventeen members and one guest (who became a member!) learned about the great collection of resources available in our own Indiana Room. Our informative session was led by our own Annette Blount, Reference Librarian and liaison between the BCGS board and the library.

Unlike most of our BCGS programs, our May program was conducted on the evening of Thursday, May 29. Dr. Tami Iorio presented before 12 members and 11 guests with a focus on her book: "Legendary Locals of Columbus Indiana." She even included some of our board members who traveled to the National Archives in Washington, D.C.

The BCGS annual luncheon occurred on July 26 with a program at the Decatur County Historical Society in Greensburg, Indiana and lunch at the famous Stories Restaurant. Our Membership Chair, Fran Land reported that there were 13 members and three visitors at our July outing. Diana Springmier was our tour guide through the Society's building at 222 N. Franklin Street: the Lathrop/Shannon House. Additional information can be found on their website: <http://www.decatourcountyhistory.org/museum.asp> Those present gathered on the front porch for a photo opportunity. We enjoyed a great lunch, including pie, at Stories.

On Saturday, September 20, we again met in the Red Room for a Program lead by Paulette Roberts. Her program: "Underground Railroad Connections in Bartholomew County" shared many details about the quilt patterns that were used during the movements of slaves from the South to the North. Attendance was excellent with a total of 34 including: 12 members and 22 guests.

The Fall BCGS SKILLS meeting was held in the Indiana Room on Saturday, November 1. The number of those attending kept increasing until we had 21 members present! Our own Becky Speaker and Toni Whiteside shared important information about scanning and using scanners as a part of our genealogical work. Some even stayed after the meeting to practice using a handheld scanner.

Our November (22) program was led by one of our own: Donna Kuhlman. Donna shared details about the

Twenty-one attendees learned much about a war that most likely knew very little about before the program. The November program also included our election of officers (details can be found in the section above).

BCGS set out 12 more War of 1812 Gravestone Markers for Veterans

BCGS started an Obituary Index at Bartholomew County Public Library.

BCGS printed Russell Wilhoit's Decatur County Genealogy Books in memory of Martha Davis, BCGS member.

Highlights

Hello, everyone. This marks my final “Highlights” because I have stepped down as BCGS secretary. The position will be filled most capably by Becky Speaker, who has been treasurer for the last two years. After seven years I am also leaving the BCGS Board. I have truly enjoyed my roles with the society – learned a lot and made many new friends. My passion for genealogy persists; I plan to remain active in BCGS; and I look forward to seeing you at programs in 2015 – and beyond. And now, the “Highlights.”

On **Saturday, November 1**, twenty-one members participated in an enlightening and entertaining SKILLS (Sharing Knowledge in Light Learning Sessions) event devoted to **Scanning Documents and Photos**. Leaders Toni Whiteside and Becky Speaker began with steps to prepare for scanning, including hand-washing (rather than gloves), readying the scanner, and organizing the items being scanned. Helpful tips included photographing pages being scanned and developing a naming convention to keep one’s scans in order. Other topics covered included storage and use of scanned documents and photos.

Our final program of 2014 took place on **Saturday, November 22**. After a brief business meeting and election of officers for 2015, nineteen members and two guests were treated to a delightful, personalized look at the **Spanish American War of 1898**. Genealogist Donna Kuhlman began with a brief overview of factors leading to the war, which included ceaseless jingoistic “yellow journalism,” practiced by Joseph Pulitzer of the **New York World** and William Randolph Hearst of the **New York Journal**. While sympathetic to the Cubans’ desire for independence, journalists Pulitzer and Hearst were motivated primarily by seeking big-headline stories that would in turn generate big newspaper sales. Following the mysterious explosion of the U.S. battleship *Maine* in Havana harbor in January, 1898, a surge in patriotic public opinion led the U.S to declare war and raise troops – all volunteers.

Among these volunteers was Company K of the 161st Regiment of Indiana Volunteer Infantry, raised in Columbus. Company K included nineteen-year-old Joseph (Joe) Luell Cook, Donna’s grandfather. Joe was a diligent correspondent, and Donna shared some of his letters home. The letters give a fascinating personal perspective on the regiment’s mustering, training, and movement to Jacksonville, Florida, in August. Joe evidently did not think much of Jacksonville, where the temperature was often 103-degrees, and the insects were fierce. By October, Company K had moved to “Camp Onward” in Savannah, a more pleasant experience for everyone. In December, as the regiment prepared to sail to Havana, the Treaty of Paris was signed, formally ending the war and ceding control of Cuba, Puerto Rico, the Spanish West Indies, Guam and the Philippines to the USA. The brass emblem memorialized the outcome, a clear victory for the USA.



After a few months in Cuba, Joe’s regiment set sail for Savannah, where they were mustered out on April 30, 1899 and came home to Indianapolis in May. Joe then lived in Michigan, Minnesota, and South Dakota for several years before returning to Bartholomew County, where he resided from 1937 until his death in 1961. For Joe and other small-town and rural volunteers, participation in the Spanish American War was undoubtedly the great adventure of their lives.

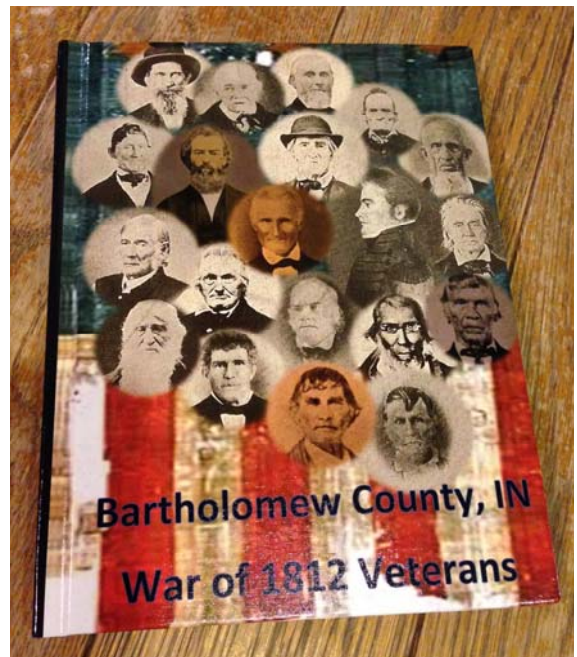

Less than 30 years after the Revolutionary War, a young American nation again declared war on Great Britain. Soldiers fought for adventure, to protect their land and family or were drafted to protect coastlines or serve garrison duty. From the time Bartholomew County was formed in 1820, many veterans moved here for the promise of new land and opportunity.

Using online research, family records, and primary documents from the National Archives in Washington, DC, BCGS has compiled what we have learned and written the stories of many of these veterans and their families who spent time in Bartholomew County or were buried here. Two hundred years after the last battle in New Orleans in Jan 1815, this 100-page hard-back book will be available for sale in February 2015 for \$30. Response 1:

There is a will, but it opens as many questions by who is NOT mentioned, as it answers with who IS an heir. (This is from an abstract.)

Will Book A, pp. 129-130

Will of David McCoy
Dated May 6, 1850
Recorded June 14, 1850

Wife Clarissa
Son David
Son-in-law William Cook
Heirs of James McCoy
Heirs of Sarah Wright, dec., Consort of Edward Wright
Lucinda Ashley and her heirs (husband William?)
Relationships of the aforementioned to the deceased is not stated.

Executor Alfred C. Thompson
Witnesses John Lewis and Francis Hartman.

Complete Record Probate, Book G p. 66

Feb. 1852

Alfred C. Thompson is confirmed June 14, 1850 as the executor of the will of David McCoy dec., with John Lewis as his security. J.L. Hartman and Francis Hartman were appraisers of the personal property. The widow Clarissa is mentioned.

That's all I have from print resources at home. There may be a few more procedural entries in the probate records, but unlikely anything that documents other presumed children who aren't mentioned in David's will. Likewise, there is nothing AT ALL that sheds any light on the parents of David McCoy. Indiana did not keep civil death records until 1882.

Response 2:

John T. Alexander did not own real estate (and only \$25 worth of personal property) in 1860, so did not leave an estate to probate.

I found a John Alexander of the right age nearby in Decatur Co. in 1850, and got all excited, thinking he must have been a son of Joseph and Ann (Reed) Alexander. But their son John died in 1854. Siiiiiiiigh.

So I'm not coming up with much else to shed light on his identity.

John T. Alexander is Memorial #11572930

Also did not find an obit for John C. Doty--obits in that period tended to be skimpy or missing altogether.

Bartholomew County Genealogical Society Founded September 22, 1990

Before September 1990 there was no genealogical society in Bartholomew County. The historical society kept and still maintains a genealogical library. But it took a man who was actively searching his roots to found a Genealogical Society in Bartholomew County. Dr. John W. Hamblen, Professor Emeritus of Computer Science from the University of Missouri-Rolla, who moved to Columbus in 1989, was the person. Not only did he have the time but he had already reprinted a relative's book on the Hamblen Family. He published the reprint of *The Hamblen and Allied Families* by A. Porter Hamblen in 1984 with an addendum.

Another desire was to pass along to others the knowledge of how and where to do genealogical research. This could best be done by forming a County Genealogical Society similar to those in other counties. On September 1, 1990, a story appeared in the *Republic* announcing an organizational meeting. Thirty people attended. Just three weeks later they met again, adopted a constitution and by-laws, set a meeting date as the fourth Saturday of each month at the public library and presented a slate of officers: President: John W. Hamblen, Vice President: Morris Begley, Secretary: Wanda Williams, Treasurer: Karen Loy, Editor: Dianne Brummett, and Genealogist: Donna Kuhlman.

While serving as Southeastern Indiana Director for the Indiana Genealogical Society, Dr. Hamblen assisted with the founding of the Tri-Counties Genealogical Society at Batesville and also the Scott County Genealogical Society. The Indiana Genealogical Society took note of John's untiring work and presented him with a Distinguished County Genealogical Service Award for his work in Brown County at the IGS State Convention in 1996.

Eager to set goals, the new society decided to work on the county cemeteries, upgrading the old records, and recording every grave. The City Cemetery was their first. Volunteers, led by Dianne Brummett and Donna Kuhlman set out to put into a book every grave's correct dates and location so it could be easily found. By October 1991, the City Cemetery book was ready for sale and work was begun on the second one for cemeteries in Harrison, Jackson, and Ohio townships. To bootstrap the printing costs for the cemetery books a proposal went to several foundations and a grant was received from the Custer Foundation in June 1992.

A quarterly newsletter, *Bartholomew County Ancestors*, was started in January 1991 with Dianne Brummett as Editor. Succeeding editors have been Imogene Weisner,

Eileen Pierce, and David & Linda Dye. The first issue contained a copy of the Constitution and by-laws and the list of forty-six founding members. Membership grew rapidly to 142 in 1998 from 16 states. Queries from new members across the nation began to pour in. Stimulating programs helped to train members in how and where to do genealogical research. Shirley Hooten presented a program on what the LDS Family History Center offered and Arthur Schwenck did a program on German research. Programs on Censuses, Military Records, and computers were presented by Dr. Hamblen.

In 1993 Wanda Williams compiled the first surname booklet which went to every member via the newsletter. In the same year, the society decided to launch a many year project of developing a Bartholomew County Families Histories book. A committee was formed with Dr. Hamblen as Chair, Marcella Jones as Secretary, and Ron Bulthuis as Treasurer. Anyone with connections to Bartholomew County was invited to submit a 500-word biography and a picture at no cost.

Since 1991 the Society has worked with the management of the COMMONS to observe "Family History Day at the Commons" to coincide with National Family Day. Several surrounding county genealogical societies and chapters of lineage societies participate in a one-day Genealogy Fair.

Anticipating growth in both membership and library material, the Society Historian, Ron Bulthuis, maintains collections of books and genealogical materials at his home but looks to the future with hope of a permanent library. The Board is also looking to the future. In February 1997, they approved a plan for accepting donations or bequests for future needs and growth. Large dona-

tions and bequests are to be made via the Heritage Fund of Bartholomew County. We look to the future from the founding date of September 22, 1990. We have come a long way in the preservation and publication of genealogical material for the civic and educational benefit of Bartholomew County families. *Submitted by Marcella Jones, President.*

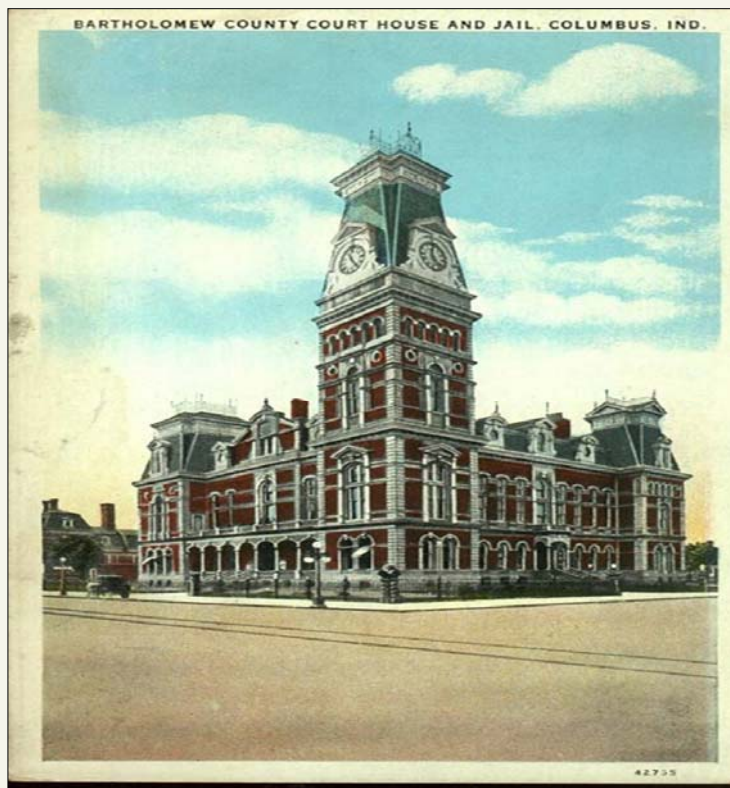
